

Annual Meeting Scheduled for November 12

Lyn P. Meyerhoff Fund and Judge Marcella Holland To Be Honored

The Women's Law Center's Annual Meeting and Awards Ceremony will be held on Wednesday, November 12 at the Hyatt Regency Baltimore located at 300 Light Street. This event is always an excellent opportunity to see old friends and colleagues, to hear about the work of the Women's Law Center and to honor leaders whose dedicated efforts have helped promote justice and fairness for women.

The Annual Meeting and Awards Ceremony festivities will include the presentation of the 18th Annual Dorothy Beatty Memorial Award, which honors contributions to protect the legal rights of women. The **Lyn P. Meyerhoff Fund** will receive the award in recognition of the Fund's support for the Financial Distribution in Divorce Research Project. Lee Meyerhoff Hendler, one of the four Trustees who manage the Fund, will accept the Beatty Award on behalf of the Fund. Ms. Hendler's personal commitment to financial independence for women helped inspire the research and advocacy initiative and she has played a leadership role in the development and implementation of the project.

Women's Law Center Board Member Susan Elgin observed that, "the generous funding from the Lyn P. Meyerhoff Fund will allow the Women's Law Center to provide the legal and advocacy community with previously

unavailable empirical information about decision making in family law cases. This information will provide the basis for policy analysis and recommendations."

The Honorable **Marcella Holland** will receive the 11th Annual Rosalyn B. Bell Award for her outstanding achievements in the area of family law. Chief Judge Robert Bell will offer an introduction of Judge Holland. As Judge in Charge of the Domestic Docket, Judge Holland's leadership and vision helped insure an effective process that addresses the special issues of litigants in Family Court. She has also been extremely supportive of the Women's Law Center's Protective Order Advocacy and Representation project in the Circuit Court for Baltimore City.

Women's Law Center Board President Gwen Tromley praised Judge Holland's contributions saying, "Judge Holland brings to the bench and to her administrative duties a valuable combination of wisdom, judgment and common sense. Her respect for litigants and her sensitivity to their needs is unwavering." Judge Holland was recently named Administrative Judge for the Circuit Court for Baltimore City, succeeding Administrative Judge Ellen M. Heller (a lifetime member and long-time supporter of the Women's Law Center) upon her retirement.

Periodically, the Women's Law Center presents the Access to Justice Award to an individual who has demonstrated outstanding personal commitment to the legal rights of women. This special award will be presented to **Maryann Feibach**. As a volunteer research consultant, Ms. Feibach dedicated countless hours to the joint Custody and Financial Distribution in Divorce Project. Her contributions significantly enhanced the rigor and professionalism of the research project. The Women's Law Center's Board and staff are extremely pleased to honor Ms. Feibach with the Access to Justice Award.

This Fall, when we honor the Lyn P. Meyerhoff Fund with our Dorothy Beatty Memorial Award, and the Honorable Marcella Holland with our Rosalyn B. Bell Award, we will celebrate the major role that research and policy analysis have played in the success of our work.

Throughout the Law Center's history, research and policy analysis have been indispensable elements of the Women's Law Center's advocacy work. They have been the foundation for direct service (to more than 6,600 people in FY '03), as well as for the center's impact litigation, educational efforts and legislative advocacy. In recent years, the Women's Law Center's research and policy analysis has been focused almost entirely upon the area of family law. Through the generosity of the late Bruce A. Kaufman and his family, the Lyn P. Meyerhoff Fund, our members, funders, staff, board, the court, and our friends, the results have been groundbreaking.

During the past year, the Law Center's staff and Board of Directors completed the arduous task of drafting its Strategic Plan (See "WLC Adopts Strategic Plan", page 4). As we examined the legal issues---other than family law-- that most dramatically affect women's lives, work and workplace issues emerged as among the areas most in need of attention. Based upon our analysis, we will inaugurate this Fall the Women's Law Center's Employment Law Committee.

This excellent Committee, comprised of attorneys from both sides of the employment law "table", will be chaired by two outstanding attorneys whose practices include extensive experience in employment law: Michele McDonald, Esquire and Nancy E. Gregor, Esquire. Both are members of the Law Center's board of directors. Ms. Gregor, the immediate past

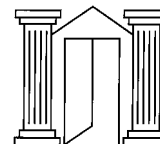

The Committee will address issues that may include equal pay, the family and medical leave act, sexual harassment, unemployment insurance and others. The committee and the law center will apply to employment law issues an approach similar to that which has been so effective in our family law work---research and policy analysis, education, legislative advocacy, impact litigation and, where possible, direct service. WLC Adopts Strategic Plan

The Women's Law Center Board adopted a mission statement and strategic plan that will guide the work of the organization for the next three to five years. After careful consideration of the organization's role in the community, analysis of the legal issues facing women and *many, many* hours of thoughtful discussion, the Board drafted a strategic plan that address five key areas that support the organization's mission. Goals were adopted and the strategies and tasks associated with those goals constitute the immediate work plan for the Board and staff. The direction and clarity that resulted from this rigorous process will help the Women's Law Center achieve its vision of a legal system that provides justice and fairness for women.

MISSION:

To serve as a leading voice for justice and fairness for women by advocating for the rights of women through policy analysis, advocacy, litigation, education, research, judicial selection, legislative advocacy and direct services. The Women's Law Center is a membership organization that offers opportunities for its members to support and participate in advocacy on behalf of women and families.

STRATEGIC PLAN

I. LEADERSHIP: The Women's Law Center is a leading voice and community resource to address issues affecting women by utilizing legal analysis and remedies.

Goal 1: Maintain visibility and participation in the community to enhance the Women's Law Center's role as an effective advocacy organization.

Goal 2: Advocate for a judiciary that demonstrates excellence and impartiality & is free of gender bias.

Goal 3: File and/or support appellate impact litigation on women's issues.

Goal 4: Respond effectively and proactively to issues and events that have an impact on women's legal rights.

Goal 5: Engage in legislative advocacy on issues that have an impact on women.

Goal 2: Analyze information and insights gained through direct services to identify systemic changes.

IV. RESEARCH AND POLICY: The Women's Law Center conducts research and policy analysis and develops and implements policy recommendations on issues affecting women and families.

Goal 1: Identify and evaluate new issues, policy areas or direct services that have an impact on women and, where appropriate, develop an action plan for response.

Goal 2: Effectively perform Financial Distribution in Divorce and Custody Research project, including development of research finding and policy recommendations.

Goal 3: Maintain expertise in the area of family law and promote activism on issues that impact women and children through an active Family Law Committee.

V. ORGANIZATIONAL DEVELOPMENT: The Women's Law Center maintains and enhances the organization's infrastructure to adequately support the implementation of the mission of the organization.

Goal 1: Develop and implement a fundraising plan that includes goals for each component and insures adequate unrestricted funding to support the mission of the organization.

Goal 2: Maintain existing funding to support current direct service projects.

Goal 3: Develop, promote and maintain a Board structure and system of accountability that insures that the Board fulfills its responsibility for fundraising, policy development and oversight.

Goal 4: Insure well-functioning staff to support implementation of the mission of the organization.

Goal 5: Complete the Standards of Excellence program sponsored by Maryland Association of Maryland Nonprofits.

Legal Round Up: A Summary of Noteworthy Cases...

Interspousal Tort Immunity

Bozman v. Bozman (2003 WL 21915874 (Md.)) - An August ruling from the Court of Appeals reversed the judgment of the Court of Special Appeals and abrogated the doctrine of interspousal tort immunity. The ruling ended a nearly 75 year history of prohibiting lawsuits between husbands and wives. Referring to the doctrine as "antiquated," the Court of Appeals ruled in favor of a man who claimed that his wife was engaged in "malicious prosecution" because she brought criminal charges against him for multiple violations of a domestic violence protective order, stalking and harassment. He sued her for \$1 million. The wife alleged that his lawsuit was barred by the doctrine of interspousal tort immunity. The Court's ruling allows the husband's suit to go forward.

The language of the opinion makes clear that the Court appreciates how demeaning the doctrine is to women. Noting that the rule was "more aptly called a 'rule in derogation of married women,'" the Court commented that interspousal tort immunity was a vestige of British common law which essentially held that, "by marriage, the husband and wife are one person in the law; that is the very being of legal existence of the woman is suspended during the marriage." Even though the doctrine has been applied in legal cases for years, there have been many criticisms of using such an outdated doctrine, and the Court's prior opinions reflect its own "misgiving[s]" about the doctrine's applicability. By getting rid of the doctrine, the ruling removes these flaws.

With this decision, Maryland joins 39 other states that permit husbands and wives to sue each other for financial damages in certain circumstances. The ruling is a significant step forward for women and WLC is encouraged to see the Court of Appeals' willingness to abolish a doctrine that is based on the historic notion that women are the property of their husbands. However, the ruling is also a potential "double-edged sword" for women. First, this

ruling may discourage women from seeking protective orders in domestic violence cases for fear of retaliatory lawsuits, like the one in this case. Men, who generally make more money than women, may be better able to finance such lawsuits. In addition, there may be a detrimental impact on the process of family law cases through the courts as a result of this ruling. The elimination of the interspousal immunity opens up the door for divorcing couples to seek yet another means of leverage over each other at a time when the court system is trying to decrease the adversary nature of family law cases (i.e. through mediation).

The *Bozman* ruling presents practitioners in Maryland with an opportunity to shape the legal landscape. The legal community will have to figure out how to or whether to incorporate civil tort remedies in the context of divorce proceedings and how to respond to such suits when there is a pending divorce action.

Domestic Violence

Silvers v. Silvers (Court of Special Appeals, No. 02-1358) In an unreported opinion, the Court of Special Appeals affirmed the Circuit Court's exercise of discretion in declining jurisdiction on the grounds of *forum non conveniens* over a petitioner/appellant's request for custody in the context of a domestic violence protective order. The Baltimore County Circuit Court had dismissed a petition for protection against domestic violence filed by Jeanette Silvers against her ex-husband, David Silvers. The prolonged custody battle that followed the parties' divorce resulted in an award of physical custody to Mr. Silver. By the time custody was decided, Mr. Silver had moved from Maryland to North Carolina. Ms. Silvers sought the protective order after she learned, during the children's summer visitation with her, that Mr. Silver had been physically abusing the children when they were with him. The Circuit Court granted a temporary protective order to Ms. Silvers on the basis of physical abuse, and granted temporary

custody of the children to Ms. Silver until the protective order hearing. However, at the protective order hearing a week later, the court dismissed the petition. Although it recognized that it had exclusive jurisdiction to modify its original custody order (granting physical custody to Mr. Silver), it also recognized that it had discretion to decline to exercise that jurisdiction, and it did so.

In affirming the lower court's exercise of discretion, the CSA noted that even though the proceeding at issue was a protective order under FL §4-506, the petition sought not only relief in the form of physical protection for the children, but also sought an award of custody, "which, because a custody order already granting [Mr. Silver] custody, was in effect a request for modification of custody." Further, it noted that a judicial decision on a petition for domestic violence protective order that seeks custody of children is a custody determination within the meaning of FL § 9-201(c). Under that section, the "home state" of the child in the 6 months preceding the time involved, is the determinative factor in deciding jurisdiction. Thus, in this case, North Carolina was considered to be the proper forum for the custody determination.

Title VII – Class Action

Dial Corporation (EEOC v. Dial Corp., N.D. Illinois, 99-C-3356) – In our last newsletter we reported that women employees of Dial Corporation were preparing for trial in a class action sexual harassment lawsuit against the soap manufacturer. Since then, the EEOC (on behalf of the women employees) and The Dial Corporation have announced that they have reached a settlement that involves payment by Dial of \$10 million. In addition to monetary relief, the parties have mutually agreed on revisions to be made to Dial's policies and procedures that prohibit sexual harassment. In addition, an independent third party will help resolve any future disagreements over the resolution of complaints at the facility.

...Studies and Trends

NOW Legal Defense Fund Family Initiative: The NOW Legal Defense Fund has launched a Family Initiative for better child care, pre-school and afterschool. The goal is to increase support for public investment in quality care for all children. The initiative recognizes the importance of quality child care to the development of children, to working parents and to business. The project seeks to engage a grass roots coalition to support a funding partnership to increase resources to assure that all families can afford the quality care their children need and deserve. Resources for Grandparents: A Guide for Relatives Caring for Children: The number of grandparents caring for children is rapidly increasing. This role poses many legal and social changes. The Department of Aging recently published a resource guide for grandparents. It offers basic information and resources on a variety of topics including legal issues, housing and health. The guide can be viewed at www.mdoa.state.md.us.

Focus on Women & Justice: The Women's Prison Association (WPA) is producing a series of briefs focusing on women involved in the criminal justice system, their families and their communities. The first in the series addresses trends in incarceration of women. The yearly rate of growth of incarceration for women is 1.5 times higher than the rate of growth for men. As a result, the gap between the number of men and the number of women in prison has narrowed. In 1977, there were 23 men for every woman in state and federal prison. In 2001, there were 15 men for every woman in prison. The incarceration of women has a significant consequence for families because many of the women are the primary caretakers

of their children. WPA observes that the increase corresponds directly to the implementation of mandatory minimum sentencing laws and suggests greater use of alternatives to incarceration, education and treatment.

Intimate Partner Violence: The Bureau of Justice Statistics reports that 691,710 instances of non-fatal intimate partner violence during 2001. In 85% of these cases, the victim was a woman. Intimate partner violence made up 20% of violent crime against women. Intimate partner violence accounted for 3% of all nonfatal violence against men. The rate of intimate violence against females declined significantly between 1993 and 2001, dropping by nearly half (49%). The rate of intimate violence against males fell 42% during the same period. The number of men murdered by intimate partners declined 68% between 1976 and 2000. The number of women killed was stable for two decades but declined after 1993. In recent years, about 33% of female murder victims were killed by an intimate partner, while only 4% of the male victims were killed by an intimate. *Bureau of Justice Statistics, Crime Data Brief, February 2003, NCJ 197838*

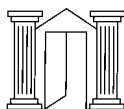
